

ART AND DESIGN AT NEWTON



INTENT: Art and Design at Newton aims to engage, inspire and challenge pupils, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design. As pupils progress, we want them to be able to think critically and develop a more rigorous understanding of art and design, knowing how it reflects and shapes our history as well as contributing to the culture, creativity and wealth of our nation. We want them to enjoy being able to express themselves creatively.

IMPLEMENT: Children begin their artistic learning journey from what they may already know or have experienced – looking at colour, faces and the world around them and beginning to record ideas in sketchbooks. They then build from that foundation as they expand their horizons to draw on a rich heritage of cultural expressions from around the world to aid them in developing their own artistic style and preferences.

Young artists at Newton will:

- produce creative work, exploring their ideas and recording their experiences
- become proficient in drawing, painting, sculpture and other art, craft and design techniques
- evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art, craft and design
- know about great artists, craft makers and designers, and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms

ASSESSMENT

Learning in Art and Design is recorded in sketchbooks. This learning may include written responses, sketches, photographs of or finished pieces of art or critiques of famous works of art. It may also include - typically in the younger years - a class learning journey where adults might capture learning as scribed oral contributions from pupils, or photographs or other observations/commentary.

Teachers assess learning in number of ways: by making observations of the children working during lessons, listening to their responses and ideas and by looking at work in sketchbooks. All these assessment tools help teachers to reach a judgement as to how well the unit content has been learnt ie. do children know, remember and can do the things we have been teaching them? While it is crucial that the teacher then acts on the outcomes of this assessment so that it informs future learning, it also provides a snapshot summary identifying who is on track, who is not there yet and who is out in front.
